<b>Ashton John</b>	Cowhill, near	Oldham	Aged 41. Carried the black flag. Sabred and trampled on the field and died before reaching the Infirmary. The inquest jury returned a verdict of accidental death. His son, Samuel, received 20/- in relief.		DIED 16 Aug 1819
<b>Ashworth John</b>	Bull's-head Inn	Manchester	Special constable. Trampled by the cavalry on the field and possibly sabred.		DIED 16 Aug 1819
<b>Bradshaw William</b>	Lilly Hill, Pilkington	Whitefield	Aged 16. Suffered a severe sabre cut to his head and trampling by the Yeomanry. Died later from his injuries.		DIED 29 Apr 1822
<b>Buckley Thomas</b>	Baretrees	Chadderton	Sabred and stabbed with a bayonet on the field and died the same day.		DIED 16 Aug 1819
<b>Campbell Robert</b>	18 Miller Street	Manchester	A watchman. Aged 57. Special constable. Killed by a mob in Newton Lane on 17 August and died next day. Buried in St John's churchyard.		DIED 18 Aug 1819
<b>Crompton James</b>		Barton-upon-Irwell	Trampled upon by the cavalry on the field and died a few days later. Buried 1 September.		DIED late Aug 1819
<b>Dawson Edmund</b>		Saddleworth	Aged 19. Sabred in the head on the field. He was in possession of a pole carrying a cap of liberty. Died in the Infirmary on 31 August. Inquest produced a verdict of 'wilful murder not allowed'.		DIED 31 Aug 1819
<b>Downes Margaret</b>			Sabred on the field. 'Dreadfully cut in the breast; secreted clandestinely and not heard of. Supposed dead'.		BELIEVED DEAD
<b>Evans William</b>	1 Owen Street, [Queen-street]	Hulme	A carter. Special constable. Employee of Pickfords. Trampled on the field by the Yeomanry Cavalry horses. Received nothing but 20/- relief from Messrs Shuttleworth and Whitworth. Died sometime after 2 December.		BELIEVED DEAD
<b>Fildes William</b>	23 Kennedy-street	Manchester	Aged 2. Son of Ann Fildes. Trampled by a cavalry horse in Cooper Street after his mother was knocked down by a lone rider. Died later that evening. Buried 19 August at the Swedenborgian chapel in Salford.		DIED 16 Aug 1819
<b>Gaunt unborn child</b>		Manchester	Child of Elizabeth Gaunt. Elizabeth was heavily pregnant and suffered brutal beating on the field. She fared little better in the New Bailey after her arrest and miscarried shortly after her release.		DIED Oct or Nov 1819
<b>Hall Samuel</b>	Hulme	Manchester	A cotton spinner in Mr Pollitt's factory. Sabred in the head & badly trampled. Reported to have died 3 weeks later in the Infirmary.		BELIEVED DEAD
<b>Heyes Mary</b>	8 Rawlinson's Bldgs, Oxford Rd	Chorlton Row	Aged 44. Trampled by a Cavalry horse on the field. Her foot was stripped of the flesh and great toe nails. She was pregnant at the time and suffered fits almost daily. She gave birth to a premature child which caused her death. The child survived. Buried in Walkers Croft burial ground. £5 received in relief.		DIED 17 Dec 1819
<b>Jones Sarah</b>	96 Silk Street [George Leigh St]	Manchester	Beaten on the head and much bruised on the field by Constables' truncheons. She identified Thomas Wordsworth (or Woodworth), a Special Constable, of Newton Lane as her assailant. £4 received in relief.		SUSPECTED DEAD
<b>Lees John</b>		Oldham	A spinner and veteran of Waterloo. Sabred and beaten by truncheons on the field. Died on 7 September. An inquest was adjourned without a verdict.		DIED 7 Sep 1819
<b>O'Neill Arthur</b>	3 Pigeon Street [Ancoats St]	Manchester	A weaver aged 40. Beaten on the field by the Constables' truncheons and trampled by the crowd; breast bruised, and internally injured. Confined for five months in the New Bailey and died soon after. £4 10s received in relief.		DIED early 1820
<b>Partington Martha</b>	King Street [Barton-upon-Irwell]	Eccles	Aged 38. Thrown into a cellar in Bridge Street by pressure of the crowd. Died on the spot. Husband received £5 in relief.		DIED 16 Aug 1819
<b>Rhodes John</b>	3 Pits, Hopwood near	Middleton	Aged 22. Sabred on the field - a cut on the head, by which he lost much blood. Dreadfully crushed in the body. Died 18 November. His father received £6 6s in relief. Inquest returned a verdict of death from natural causes.		DIED 18 Nov 1819
<b>Whitworth Joseph</b>	Hyde, near	Stockport	Aged 19. Killed by a musket ball to the head in Ancoats Street, New Cross, on the evening of the 16th August. Died later in the Infirmary. Inquest found that he was shot at New Cross. His father received £4 in relief.		DIED 20 Aug 1819
